IMPACT

The WRENCH's activities promote community engagement and empowerment by offering accessible services and events like Open Shop, Summer Sales, Pop-up programs, and Bike Bazaars. These inclusive events allow participants to connect, fostering a sense of belonging.

To improve financial accessibility, the WRENCH offers sliding scale or by-donation services, reducing cost barriers for bike repairs or purchases, and promoting social equity by making cycling accessible to a wider audience.

Environmental stewardship is achieved through bike and part processing, reusing discarded bikes and parts from Winnipeg's 4R sites, reducing waste, and promoting a circular economy for a sustainable environment.

By advocating for cycling as a sustainable transportation mode, the WRENCH fosters education and awareness about carbon emissions and urban design, ultimately contributing to reduced emissions and safer, more connected neighborhoods.

Our bikes and parts are collected from Winnipeg's 4R sites by volunteer and staff mechanics who demanufacture, sort, and build bikes from these reclaimed parts back at our fully stocked shop. This work happens throughout the year to support our suite of education and service programs.

Open Shop and Summer Sales

A weekly service to the public for repairs, parts, and bike purchases. The WRENCH also sells and repairs bikes at our Forks Kiosk in the summer months. Bicycle repairs and used parts are offered by sliding scale/by donation.

The WRENCH sells quality, refurbished bicycles at affordable prices. Customers who buy a bike from The WRENCH not only get a great bike at a great price, but also the knowledge that their purchase supports our mission.

Pop-up programs, repairs, and giveaways

The WRENCH responds regularly to requests for onsite repairs, à la carte programs, and giveaways. We travelled to Ste Rose, Teulon, Bloodvein, and Stonewall in 2022.

Empty the Fill

We performed three Empty the Fills in 2022. These volunteer-run events are held onsite at Brady Road 4R site to accomplish high volumes of bike processing as quickly as possible.
